Standard Theranos statistics

Can you clarify this? We already have language around turn-around time, certifications, etc., so wondering what other statistics you're looking for

Theranos implications for Medicare and Medicaid, on both state and federal basis

 Eg. If Medi-Cal dropped rates to Theranos levels, the state would save \$22.9B over 10
 vears

To clarify, the stat is 21.9B in aggregate savings to MediCal over 10 years starting in 2013. This was calculated via CMS projections of their lab spend (CMS.gov) and the impact that Theranos pricing will have. We can list the sources here as: CMS.gov, KFF.org and Theranos estimates

• The pre-and post-analytical phases of the lab testing process account for 93% of errors – is there a more recent statistic than this 1993 AACC article?

The source of this stat came from a clinical chemistry article in 1993, as we sent earlier, but this statistic is still often mentioned in more contemporary articles. For example, "Identification of the Types of Preanalytical Errors in the Clinical Chemistry Laboratory" published by LabMedicine in 2009 cites the article/stat from 1993 in its first footnote.

Lab testing hasn't changed/innovated in XX years

Great chart in this Clinical Chemistry article: <u>A Guide to the History of Clinical Chemistry</u>. **This overviews the milestones of instrumental techniques to clinical chemistry starting in 1913, and ending in 1983 with PCR.** This was published in 2011 so the takeaway here is that there has not been any <u>milestone innovation</u> in 30 years.

GROW will work to track down numbers and attributions for the following data points, unless you happen to have any of them already available:

• % of patients that comply with lab testing orders

• We previously found "only 62% of recommended laboratory and radiology tests were provided for preventive, acute, and chronic care," but will confirm and look for others

- On average, people have to drive xx mi/xx hours to get blood testing
- % of people who get their lab tests at hospitals because they're closer/convenient
- Check availability of night/weekend lab testing at other labs (LabCorp/Quest)? All testing or just certain types?
- % of people who are afraid of needles
- % of people who are anxious waiting for results
- % of uninsured who get lab tests in the ER vs. paying for testing out of pocket
- Phlebotomy statistics (first phlebotomist, etc.)

- Theranos validation reports
- Theranos price list
